Opening of a New Exhibit Look Close SEE FAR A Cultural Portrait of the Maya


June 23, 2012, 2:00 pm, Free Admission

Photographer Bruce T. Martin presents his exhibit *Look Close See Far, A Cultural Portrait of the Maya* at his talk at 2:00 pm on Saturday, June 23 followed by a reception from 3:00 to 4:30 pm.

Mr. Martin has photographed the Maya of Mexico, Belize, Honduras, El Salvador, Guatemala, and Honduras with passion and dedication for over twenty years. His exhibit features the intersection of numerous disciplines including photography, cultural and spiritual studies, and archaeology. It offers a sensitive and intimate look at the people themselves and the forests, ruins and villages in which they have been rooted for generations.

The exhibition is accompanied by Martin's book of the same name as the exhibit.
